Throughout the school year, children received bronze, silver and gold wristbands depending on the amount of physical activity that they were doing. 		Children were also aware of the physical and mental impact exercise had on them as children regularly checked their heart rates and were less tired during the school day. The 30:30 Wristband Challenge will now stop as it has ran its cycle with many children receiving gold wristbands.
