


Year 6: Mr Lancaster, Miss Toovey, Mrs Davey April-May 2025

Writing:

Reading:

All children will have their own reading book chosen at their reading level. We would like you to send your child to school each day with it, along with their planner. The children also have reading comprehension practice books to complete at home.

Please make sure that you sign your child's reading record at least 3 times a week in order to have their book changed.

Each week, children in Year 6 will receive Reading and Maths homework. Details of when it is given out will be communicated to you on Class Dojo.
